Atchison, Brown and Doniphan County K-State Research and Extension Offices are in the process of forming a district. Creating a district will ensure our residents have access to impactful programs and services. District funding leverages economies of scale, reducing administrative overhead and maximizing taxpayer dollars.

Districting Solutions

Extension is part of a nationwide educational and outreach network created in 1914. Extension has adapted to the changing times to improve the livelihoods and quality of life of residents. There is an Extension Office in virtually all of the 3,000 counties across the US.

According to the 2023 Annual Report for every dollar invested in Extension, there is a \$17 return to the Kansas Economy.

Quick Facts on Districting

- County financials will continue to be reviewed monthly by the Elected District Board and the K-State Accounting Office. The district will conduct a comprehensive audit of all financials on a yearly basis.
- All three county office locations will remain open.
- Residents will retain control over local programs. Program Development Committees (PDC) for each county will continue to advise staff on local educational and programmatic needs.
- All staff members will remain employed.

Quick Facts for 4-H 🏶

- County Fairs will remain unchanged, as each County Fair Association is responsible for managing fair events.
- County 4-H Events may be combined when feasible and beneficial for our youth, such as during Club Days and Project Meetings.
- With districting we will be able to hire a 4-H Youth Development Agent to increase 4-H programing within the three counties.



July 2024 21 districts and 46 county units I am in favor of consolidating Atchison, Brown and Doniphan counties into an Extension District. It is my understanding that there are already some shared events between these counties already. It just makes sense to collaborate staffing to attract or retain high caliber talent to run these programs and spread the costs over a larger audience. It is a struggle in rural areas to find competent and qualified help to efficiently run these organizations. I have firsthand experience of the positive effects that collaboration provides within organizations. I am a current board member of Amberwell Hiawatha, which worked with Amberwell Atchison to create an affiliation agreement where the two hospitals can share some services and operating contracts that have been beneficial to both organizations. It is my hope that the same can be true for consolidating Extension for these three counties. – Greg Rodvelt – Horton KS

There are several reasons I support the formation of an Extension district comprised of Doniphan, Brown, and Atchison counties. There has already been collaboration between these agents for shared adult programming and for 4-H events. The ability to work as a team has already begun. I know from my work experience that working as a team is stronger than working alone. Individual strengths combine for a stronger unit. Varied experiences and areas of expertise make for a stronger foundation. Being part of a larger team should also help attract and retain new Extension agents. Because districting is not a new concept, groundwork for such is already in place. There should be fewer growing pains now compared to several years ago. These three counties are similar enough and they should be compatible in this process. Change can feel uncertain and sometimes anticipated as a loss, but my experience is that most change can result in something becoming even stronger than before. - Joyce Rush – Highland, KS

The Loess hills of Doniphan County make up what are arguably the best soils in the state of Kansas. Its capacity to grow almost any crop from grains to produce, to timber and forages is unrivaled in most of our state. However, as farming practices evolve, rural communities constrict, and leadership programs for our youth are limited. It is imperative we search for better ways to not only offer programs, but to look for expertise rather than general knowledge.
