SNACKS: Wathena Sunflower, Bendena, Doniphan Star and Highland C. All 4-H families are welcome at this event.



Doniphan County 4-H Parent and Youth Shotgun Meeting Highlights

On September 28th, we held a 4-H Parent and Youth Shotgun meeting. As some of the key takeaways were that we are hoping by April of 2026 to have enrolled youth in the shotgun project. Enrolled youth must attend a mandatory safety meeting before attending practices. Practices will be May through August. Doniphan County Corn Variety Plot Results

The 2025 Doniphan County Corn Variety Plot results are in with RENK 8585TRE ranking first. This year's Corn Plot like many other corn fields in Doniphan County had Southern rust impacting it. Please see the plot results insert.

What is Southern Rust?

Southern rust is caused by the fungus *Puccinia polysora*. It is considered a tropical disease, as it typically is endemic to corn production in southern United States.

Southern rust development is favored by high humidity and temperatures over 80 degrees F. Corn leaves develop pustules which are circular or oval lesions. Spores are orange then become brown and have dark circles. These may form on husks, leaf sheaths, and ears.

According to the Crop Protection Network, Southern rust weather conditions favor disease. Frequent rainfall contributes to development. It is also dependent on crop development stage, hybrid susceptibility, and how long the leaf is wet. Leaf wetness over 6 hours combined with the high humidity and temperatures of 80 F makes favorable conditions for Southern rust development. This disease impacts yield up to around 45%.

HYPERTENSION AWARENESS AND PREVENTION PROJECT (HAPp)
Self-Monitored Blood Pressure and Nutrition Education

What is HAPp?
HAPp blends the American Heart
Association awareness campaigns with
CC Healthy Heart Ambassador Blood
Pressure Self-Monitoring Program. HAPp
will include blood pressure and nutrition
education.

HAPp Extension agents (Kathy Tharman) are trained Healthy Heart Ambassador coaches who close the loop on referrals by encouraging participants to share blood pressure readings with their healthcare team.

Participants use blood pressure tracking to inform lifestyle change.

HAPp Extension programs offer walk-in office hours in convenient and accessible locations (Doniphan Extension office).

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

*Age 18 or older

*Hypertension diagnose or on antihypertensive medicine

*Interest in and readiness for the program

All HAPp activities are conducted by a KSRE agent trained as a Healthy Heart Ambassador Coach.

GOALS:

*improve hypertension health literacy
*become advocates for their own health
*Help participants to make connections
between lifestyle/behavior and their blood
pressure readings.

*Connect with community resources

*Cooperate with their providers for blood pressure readings.

DONIPHAN COUNTY HAPp Program will begin February 10th 2026 at the 4-H Building in Troy KS. 5:00 p.m. One hour time commitment

We will meet once a month on the 2nd
Tuesday for four months; January - April.
*You will receive a free blood pressure
cuff and nutrition education.
You must commit to the program for the
four months. You will attend a one hour
monthly lesson plus check in with Kathy
to discuss your program progress.

TURKEY THOUGHTS

I'm writing about some concerns I have as a turkey. It seems that in your infinite wisdom, you decided to make us fat, flightless, and evidently delicious. Did we say something to make you mad.

Turkey boasts an impressive nutrition profile Turkey is rich in nutrients. Two thick slices (3.5 ounces) of turkey contain:

Calories: 117
Protein: 24 grams

Fat: 2 grams Carbs: 0 grams

Niacin (vitamin B3): 61% of the Daily Value

(DV)

Vitamin B6: 49% of the DV Vitamin B12: 29% of the DV Selenium: 46% of the DV

Zinc: 12% of the DV

Sodium: 26% of the DV

Phosphorous: 28% of the DV Choline: 12% of the DV Magnesium: 6% of the DV Potassium: 4% of the DV

The nutrients in turkey depend on the cut. For example, dark meat, which is found in active muscles such as the legs or thighs, tends to have more fat and calories than white meat — whereas white meat contains slightly more protein. Furthermore, turkey skin is high in fat. This means that cuts with the skin on have more calories and fat than skinless cuts.

For example, 3.5 ounces (100 grams) of turkey with the skin packs 169 calories and 5.5 grams of

with the skin packs 169 calories and 5.5 grams of fat, whereas the same amount without the skin has 139 calories and just 2 grams of fat.
